Linda Roy

Linda joined AAUW in 2009, and enjoyed participating in book clubs and Word Games, but it was *Leading to Reading* that truly called out to her spirit as an educator. When she joined LTR, she packed books, did fundraising, and scheduled people to do public readings. Linda also happily sat on the committee that led to the establishment of LTR's latest

initiative, Books for Babies, which will give a book to every child born at Vassar Hospital – 2,500 babies each year! When she retired, AAUW met a real need to stay relevant and find others of like mind. Though Linda had become a school principal, "My classroom experience – teaching children to read – was the most enjoyable. So, finding *Leading to Reading* enabled me to make a difference by continuing to bring reading to the community." Linda graduated from Vassar with a BA, earned her Masters from Bank St. Graduate College of Education, and SAS from Fordham University.

Ann Carmen Pinna

Ann has been a lifelong follower of the teachings and example of Eleanor Roosevelt, focused on issues of social justice and human rights. When Ann first joined AAUW, she got involved with *Leading to Reading*, an effort she still champions. More recently, however, she found a footing in the

Court Watch program where she organized the initiative, Stand Up to Domestic Violence. For Ann, going into the courts is heartfelt and important. It means looking for systemic breakdowns, talking to judges about making improvements, and seeing that women are treated fairly. She has also organized a day-long training for new court monitors. Ann is very impressed with the role AAUW plays in advancing gender equality, and she loves networking at the Branch – getting to know women, their struggles, hopes, and vision. She feels tied in kinship to AAUW's members and their commitment to do "what's good and what's best" to empower others. Her legendary organization skills were put to good use 3 years ago when she helped to organize the State Convention at Honors Haven and helped with program development as well. Ann graduated from Regis College with a BA in English, earned her MA in Education from SUNY Albany, and also studied at Oxford University, Harvard, and NYU.

Eleanor Burch

Ellie joined AAUW in the 1960's when the biggest fund-raisers were 3-day long book fairs at the old Poughkeepsie YMCA! Like many members of long standing, she left the organization for a few years to attend to work and family, and rejoined when she retired. As

"Corresponding Secretary", Ellie hand-carried the latest

edition of the Branch to the Poughkeepsie Post Office with two little children draped over her arm, and licked hundreds of stamps each month. "That's a lot of licks," Ellie said. "Zip codes were just getting started and there was a nasty little man at the counter who was strict about how things were done." More recently, Ellie led one of the largest and most venerable Interest Groups, the Manderley Literary Society, and then passed the baton several years ago. When she moved to Poughkeepsie with her husband, she knew no one when she arrived. AAUW then became her lifeline to interesting people with similar interests. "There were not many things for young mothers to do then," she explained. The AAUW has allowed Ellie to keep up with "what's going on and what's important in the world." She has held a number of positions on the Board over the years, but clearly, the role of Corresponding Secretary was the most memorable. Ellie earned her Bachelor's and Masters degrees at SUNY New Paltz.

Karen Haynes

Karen joined AAUW in 2005. Shortly before, she had left a long-term volunteer spot with the Girl Scouts and was looking for a compatible organization with a similar mission and philosophy. In AAUW, she found just that – "a great group of like-minded professional women with an orientation to service." In fact, she has come to think of AAUW as "the place where leaders go after Girl

Trekkers walk the Rail Trail as well as more challenging terrain, and "because it's such a wonderful way to meet new friends, there's always someone to walk with you." Karen also participates in Pins & Needles, World Travelers, and Movie Night. "AAUW fills my life. It brings women together, and Interest Groups are at the heart of it." In 1978, Karen graduated from the St. Francis School of Nursing in Hartford, CT, and worked for many years as an Emergency Room RN at St. Francis Hospital in Poughkeepsie. She is now a Legal Assistant in her husband's law firm.

Linda Roberts

Linda joined AAUW 17 years ago, and after a hiatus to attend to her career as a teacher, resumed her membership in 2006. Her first position on the Board was as Legal Advocacy Fund Chair. Since then, she has been the New York State Convention Treasurer for 4 years, Educational Opportunities Fund Vice-President for 3 years, Co-Chair of the Writers' Tea for 5 years, and Chair of the Auction for the Writers' Tea for



What a great year! We had so many applications! Finally, our message has reached many area college women. This year we are supporting two young women to attend the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL)!

Meet Marissa Zuleta, a student at Marist studying Social Work, was just elected president of the Social Work Association. Marissa has already established herself as an active, socially conscious young woman with great leadership potential. She has interned at an "Intercultural Drop in Center" in Dublin, Ireland. Marissa, as a Fulfillment Fund Scholar, has counseled at-risk high school students, sharing her own



experiences. She participated in training at the Family Services Sexual Violence Prevention Department. She is involved with the Center of Civic Engagement and Marist Campus Ministry, which has given her the chance to volunteer at Clinton Middle School and The Pines at Poughkeepsie. Marissa says that "immigrant issues are a passion of mine." Her professors observe her "passion for helping communities of all kinds" and her "strong social justice agenda." When I met her she was so excited and grateful for this opportunity.

We are also pleased to introduce Ashley Clark-Bryant,

Biology major at Marist College, who was recently appointed as a Resident Assistant. Ashley has been developing her leadership strength since high school. As President of the NAACP Youth Council in 2013-14, Ashley established an after-school program at the Nepperhan Community Center in Yonkers. AAUW-NYS 2016 Convention Report

Convention opened on April 15 at the Holiday Inn in Saratoga Springs, NY. We had a beautiful week-end in Saratoga Spring with walks through Congress Park and tours of this historic area. On Friday, Poughkeepsie was represented at the state board meeting by **Cyd Averill** and **Mary Lou Davis**. On Friday night the keynote focused on an eight year state wide campaign for pay equity reform.

Saturday morning our delegation of Cyd Averill, Mary Lou Davis, Kathy Friedman, Betty Harrel, Diane Jablonski, Geeta Desai, Bonnie Auchincloss, Mary Coiteux, Barbara Van Itallie, Kay Saderholm, Marcine Humphrey, and Margaret Nijhuis was joined by Linda Roberts, Maria DeWald and Janna Whearty. The business meeting, always an important part of the convention, saw the appointment of Diane Jablonski as treasurer for a one year unexpired term and the election of Geeta Desai as the AAUW-NYS VP for Programming. Betty Harrel will serve on the board as the Administrative Director to the new President Roli Wendorf. Mary Lou Davis gave the Nominating Committee Chair reports for the officers and District members of the Nominating Committee.

The business meeting was followed by a panel discussion "The Path Towards Women's Economic Achievement." The Election Question

Many politicians search for ways to increase their popularity with voters. Some respect the multi tasking roles of women, support legislation for equal pay, equal rights and access to health and child care. And then there are others who put down women in hopes of increasing their popularity among people who think misogyny is macho, make inappropriate sexual remarks, joke about the pay gender gap, try to regulate woman's health and politically discriminate by avoiding legislation. What is popular to them is unpopular to others...and vice versa.

Our close neighbor Governor Chris Christie vetoed New Jersey's Equal Pay Bill that would have prohibited employers from paying women less than men for "substantially similar" work. New Jersey's bill would have restarted the statute of limitations each time an employee was given an unfair paycheck and allowed the employee to get back pay for the time she was being paid less. Christie called the bill "nonsensical" and said it would make New Jersey "very business unfriendly." It's a popular position with NJ business owners; unpopular with NJ workers.

Governor Brown in California (the strictest and most aggressive law), Governor Andrew Cuomo in New York (similar to CA), Governor Malloy in Connecticut and Governors from Illinois, Delaware, North Dakota, and Oregon signed into law measures aimed at narrowing the gender wage gap and guaranteeing equal pay. This is a highly popular move for incumbents seeking office?



However, this should not be a state by state issue. All American women, regardless of geography, should be the beneficiaries of equal pay. While we applaud the states that recognize the pay gap and try to assert that equal work deserves equal pay, federal legislation is needed to bring equality into the American workplace.

The Paycheck Fairness Act is a comprehensive bill that strengthens the Equal Pay Act by taking meaningful steps to create incentives for employers to follow the law, empower women to negotiate for equal pay, and strengthen federal outreach and enforcement efforts. The Paycheck Fairness Act is an overdue refresh to the 1963 law that will help to ensure that all working women get equal pay for equal work.

All over the country, at the state and city level, the demand for equal pay is growing. Members of Congress need to step up and make change for ALL families by supporting the Paycheck Fairness Act – because if Congress doesn't act, the gender pay gap won't close in our lifetimes.

Make this your popular position. Don't be a victim of unequal pay because of your address.

To be or not to be a paid equally? That is the election. ■

VISIT TO AFRICAN BURIAL GROUND

Did you know 15,000 - 20,000 Africans are buried in Lower Manhattan? As recently as 25 years ago, even that question would have been greeted with disbelief. Yet in 1991, while conducting an archeological investigation prior to construction of a new Federal Building, skeletal remains in what is known as the African Burial Ground were recovered.

AAUW's Diversity Initiative will visit this important – and some say life changing – site. It will deepen our knowledge of and connection with the role Africans and people of African descent played in the early development of this country. "The discovery of the African Burial Ground in Lower Manhattan resonates as one of the largest and earliest sites associated with 18th century slavery in the country," according to the New York Preservation Archive Project. It sheds light on slavery in the northern colonies, and acknowledges the critical role Africans played in the building and functioning of New York.


